

The Decatur County commis- Stallman's office will pay more for sioners approved the purchase of a copier to be shared by the register of deeds and road and bridge offices on the first floor of the courthouse.

Judy Gaumer, register of deeds, and Tim Stallman, road and bridge supervisor, asked about the copier at the last meeting in December, but wanted it to come out of the 2009 budget. The commissioners said they would have to wait to make a decision in that case.

The copier will cost \$3,385 from Office Works of Colby.

Mrs. Gaumer said since her office has the trade-in copier, Mr. er, would split the cost.
