### **Broken line causes fire**

The Decatur County Fire Department fought a fire in an oil heater at a construction site north of town Thursday afternoon.

Chief Bill Cathcart said the call came in around 2:15 p.m. after a fuel line broke on an oil heater at Venture Corp.'s asphalt plant two miles north of town. The crew is putting an overlay on U.S. 83 for the Kansas Department of Transportation.

The fuel line spewed diesel fuel on the engine and started a fire. Venture Corp. crew members had

already started to cover the flames with sand, the chief said, and the firemen used a class B foam to keep the fumes from igniting.

In a fire like this, the chief said, water tends to spread the flames, since oil floats on top of the water.

A Venture Corp. employee was injured when he got hot oil on his arm, the chief said. He was taken to the Decatur County Hospital by ambulance.

There was no explosion, he said, and no other injuries.

### **County gets 8 percent** reduction on insurance

sioners talked last Tuesday with a bill for the year's premium recently, representative from the county's insurance company about the history of the policy and a recent 8 percent reduction in the premium.

The commissioners insure the county's buildings and vehicles with the Kansas Counties Association Multi-Lined Pool. That agency, along with the Kansas Worker Risk Cooperative for Counties, said insurance representative Larry Sharp, is tailor made for counties.

The agency covers liability and property, basically everything but worker's compensation, he said.

All of the people on that board are county officers, said Commissioner Ralph Unger, so they understand what's happening in counties across the state.
