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



in-clinic IV therapies. There are three doctors, Dr. Brewster Kellogg, Dr. Darren Matchell, and Dr. LaDonna Regier. Other professional staff includes nurse practitioners Luetta Flanagin, Jenny Niblock, Tina Jallow, and Trish Carney. They are actively recruiting a new physician.

They offer a number of diagnostic services within the clinic including pulmonary function, non-stress testing for obstetric patients, colposcopy and leep procedures for abnormal pap smears, and an array of other diagnostic services.

Staff and leaders at the Decatur County Hospital plan to stay one step ahead on technology changes.

Lynn Doeden, chief executive officer, said the hospital will be receiving new radiology equipment soon, which is part of staying on top of new technology. The new equipment should be in this month and be ready to use at the beginning of May.

With the new x-ray machine, said Doeden, it will all be digitized so the x-rays can be sent to other hospitals or off to be read over the computer. Currently the x-rays have to be made and then mailed or carried by the patient.

In some cases the new equipment could be a real plus for the patient, she said, because the x-ray maybe able to be sent over the computer to another doctor and the patient might not have to travel to see him or her.

The board of trustees is paying for the item which cost \$166,000 with renovation to the x-ray room.

Doeden said here won't be a lot of 2013 now.

training needed for the new machine, other than something in house.

The hospital staff is continuing to scan records so they can eliminate the paper files, she said. The hospital has been scanning records for the past two years.

It's possible, said Doeden, there might be some money in the president's stimulus plan. If the hospital can stay ahead technology wise, maybe some of that money can come her, but who knows.

Really, she said, ever since the hospital switched from being run by Banner Health Systems to being done locally, the board, staff and herself have tried to stay ahead on technology.

All of the charting is now done on the computer as well as the other technological changes.

Decatur County owns the building, she said, and Decatur Health Systems leases it from the county for \$5 a year. The contract is renewable, she said, and it's paid for five years in advance. The hospital is paid up until

The number of surgeries from 2007 to 2008 also dropped by 100.

The hospital now can't do births unless it's scheduled when a surgeon is available, said Doeden, because if a c-section is needed they have to be able to get their patient to a hospital with a surgeon within 30 minutes. That's not possible.

Until another physician comes on board, one that can do the surgeries, she said, the hospital will be in the same boat.

The hospital, said Doeden, doesn't employe the doctors. They have credentialing privileges at the hospital so they can take care of patients.

At the beginning of the year Dr. Obed Saint-Louis was hired at Oberlin Medical Arts, the clinic, and he had

privileges at the hospital. He wasn't able to do c-sections either.

The department, said Marilyn Gamblin, health administrator, offers lots of services including family planning, immunizations, the Women, Infant and Children program, foot care, a bi-annual health fair and child care licensing inspections for day-care

Services offered include minor excisions, laceration repair, microdermabrasion, botox and cosmetic laser procedures.

The clinic has a full lab and x-ray department available to the patients.

Administrator Barb Whitney said they accept a full range of health insurance including both Medicare and Medicaid.

At 106 S. Rodehaver is Fredrickson Dental, offering full family dental care, with Dr. Gary Fredrickson at

The office offers general dental care for families, including fillings, crowns, partials, dentures and cosmetic whitening of teeth using the Zoom system. They have one orthodontist that works with patients at the office. Robyn Rouse, a dental hygienist, works two days a week.

The office staff processes all insurance, but are a provider for Delta Dental and Blue Cross/Blue Shield.

At 105 S. Penn Avenue is Lifetime Eyecare, where Dr. Dirk Gray and Dr. Robert Stamm see patients on Wednesdays. The clinic is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Thursday.

The Oberlin offices is a branch of Lifetime Eyecare Specialist of Mc-Cook. The office in McCook is open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m Monday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday, 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday, 8 a.m. 4 p.m. Friday and 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday.
