Verbal responses from the hospital staff to such a phone call are translated into typed information that appears on the computer screen for the disabled at our facility.

Our website also provides links to the Centers for Disease Control and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment to make it easy to find the most current information on the H1N1 Swine Influenza. Take advantage of these resources to keep yourself healthy.

Decatur Health Systems is the largest employer in Decatur County. In 2008 our gross income was \$9,147,911. Of that amount, \$2,606,582 was deducted for charity care and contractuals. Contractuals are the losses our facility takes for honoring Medicare, Medicaid and insurance company agreements.

Contracts with health insurance companies are a community service our patients expect, but this service causes us to lose money through insurance write-offs. Operating expenses, including salaries, benefits, utilities and supplies in 2008 were \$6,904,980, leaving us with revenue of \$49,147. Last year Cedar Living Center had 50 dismissals. Forty percent of that number were people who returned home following rehab
