It is hard for me to wrap my mind around the fact that it is finally "The Good Old Summertime." This last week, I have been helping to paint the decorative wood that goes on the bell tower of the Presbyterian Church in Hill City. The church was built in 1890 and this is only the third time the bell tower has had extensive work done on it. I nearly forgot in all the furor of painting that I needed this article in before the first of June. So, here it is.

It seems like it was a long and depressing winter this year. I think it was more the economy and the worries that go with a poor economy that put us all in a "blue cloud." However, leave it to spring and flowers, graduations, vacations, and all that goes with the advent of summer, and the spirit of the nation just seems to be lifted.

Nofsinger went on to say Christians are like the trees, in that we need to support one another. We can bring our gifts that God has given each of us, yes, even you! That way, there is a balance between the strengths and weaknesses. That brings encouragement to each of us when it is needed.

When members are absent for lengths of time, they are missed. Not only for their presence in worship, but their gifts that they bring, and I am not speaking of monetary gifts, but those that the Spirit gives each of us. We are a little like logs in a fireplace that help to keep each other aflame. If one log is pulled away from the others, it will burn with less intensity without the flames of the others.

Yes, and the sermon is important, even though it might not be readily recalled, at some level it is remembered. It is there to be brought forth when answers to life's problems are needed. Nofsinger said that it is a little like the thousands of meals that our wives and mothers cook for us. We could never recall them all, even the very best of them, but they nourished us, and gave us strength. 
