

Storm chasers head to Colby

About 160 storm chasers, including over 100 scientists from across the country, rolled into Colby on Tuesday as part of what Josh Wurman, president of the Center for Severe Weather Research, calls the biggest tornado study ever.

The Vortex 2 project includes a multi-year study on some of the most dangerous storms on earth,

The convoy of scientists, engineers, students and volunteers from universities, private and government organizations and international members from Italy, Netherlands, the United Kingdom, Canada and Australia, are going from state to state following severe weather outbreaks on the Great Plains. In particular, Vortex 2 is looking for supercell thunderstorms, giant rotating storms that can produce strong and damaging tornados.

Glen Romine, a research scientist with the University of Illinois, said the group is trying to determine the origin, evolution and structure of not affiliated with Vortex 2, often tornadoes that form from supercells. A supercell is a classification of thunderstorm whose inner clouds rotate, he said. They can move independent of prevailing winds and often produce hail, heavy rains and tornados.

Supercells can form anywhere in the world, but the right conditions occur most often on the Great

Romine said this is the first time that all of the instruments used to

study tornados have been brought together in one place.

The National Science Foundation and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration have contributed over \$10 million to the effort.

Wurman said planning for the project began in 2003. The group began tracking tornadoes and thunderstorms on May 10 and they will finish up around June 13, depending on storm activity. They will be tracking tornadoes next year. After the conclusion of the proj-

ect, the scientists will return to their home institutions to study the data. Romine said so much data will be collected that it will take scientists more than 15 years to go through Sean Casey and his team from the

Discovery Channel's Storm Chasers also came to town. Casey designed and built his Tornado Intercept Vehicle, a heavy, armored truck meant to drive into the center of tornados. Casey is using the vehicle to film an Imax movie about tornados. The Storm Chasers crew, while

partners with the science team, Romine said, to help determine where to find the best storms. On Wednesday, the crew was doing practice exercises on county roads near Levant.

Romine said he wasn't sure yet which way Vortex 2 would head out of Colby. The decision can often be a difficult one, since the right conditions may be in several places around the Midwest.
