125 YEARS AGO - June 1884

J.C. Duncan of the east side was an agreeable caller at this printing ranch last Friday.

Harvest will begin in earnest next week.

5,749 acres of school land are advertised for sale in this issue: double the amount ever offered at one time before.

Prof. C.H. Sternberg, working under the instructions of Prof. March of Yale College, is making a geological survey of Norton County.

Klayton Klatter: J.D. Tade of Decatur post office is hauling lumber from Lenora to build a large octagon house.

Mr. E.L. Pease surprised the natives by bringing out a fine bunch of bananas, the first ever seen in Clavton.

Cheyenne County has just had the first county road established within its borders.

100 YEARS AGO - June 1909

Oakley was visited with a flood last week that nearly drowned out the town. It is claimed that nearly 17 inches of rain fell in a 6 hour period.

Jap Mines shipped 180 head of cattle that he has had on feed last week. The check in payment, to the amount of \$15,000 arrived a day or so ago

A mighty fine rain came Friday night, just in time to keep the crops growing.

The K.C. Fosters beat Oberlin 7-2 in Monday's game. O'Toole and Briggs were the battery for Oberlin. In a Tuesday's game it took 10 innings to settle who was the winner and 4-3 was the score. Barnes and Coldren were Oberlin's battery. K.C. made 3 hits and Oberlin 4 and each team made 2 errors.

It took Jennings 11 innings to beat Kanona recently and the score was 12-11. Herndon beat Traer 14-4 last Sunday.

75 YEARS AGO - June 1934

What harvest, such as it is in the county, is in full swing this week. The best yield we have heard of comes from the farm of Burton Lofton near Cedar Bluffs where a 65-acre field ran 32 bushels to the acre. Art and Bill Powell of Lyle harvested some 25 bushels of wheat and Hiram Warner had 40 acres

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that made 12 bushels. In the Sappa Valley neighborhood the average will be around 3 bushels. Many fields are returning 1 to 5 bushels and some is not being cut. Most of the wheat is being marketed as it is cut, the seller getting from 70 to 75 cents a bushel.

With the completion of projects let last week, US Highway 36 will offer an all-weather dustless highway on this popular east-west route across the state.
