Last Monday there were 13 immigrant wagons in town at one time. J.B. Jenkins informs us the Cedar Bluffs mill is ready to run again as the dam has been repaired.

We have sold the Herald block to Maj. W.C. Don Carlos of Kirwin, reserving the south room for one year, during which we expect to erect a suitable building for the Herald.
