75 YEARS AGO - Sept. 1934

The large crowd that gathered from all sections of the county to hear Gov. Landon and Frank Carlson, Republican candidate for Congress, was variously estimated from 1,000 to 1,500 persons. The speaking was held on the courthouse lawn at three o'clock in the afternoon Friday and was preceded with a few numbers by the Decatur Community High School band under the direction of Bert Hostinsky. W.T. Wolfe, chairman of the Republican county committee, introduced the distinguished speakers.

Gov. Landon assured the voters of Decatur County a continuation the federal government in the relief problems.

50 YEARS AGO - Sept. 1959

Foot-long hotdogs, a dance, a country store, bargains, an outhouse, weapons, Chief Evergreen Tree, old-time costumes — these were all elements of the second Mini-Sapa Jubilee last Friday and Saturday. At least 1,000 persons visited the museum grounds during the two days according to the guest register at the Country Store.

Coming the greatest distance was Mrs. W.E. Knox, nee Lucy Frewen, who journeyed from Boston, Mass, for two reasons: celebration of her 70th birthday with her twin sister, Gladys Ward, and the Jubilee. The women were born 10 miles south of Oberlin. Their post office was Hooker and their postmaster was Mrs. Lydia Barnes, sister of Wild Bill Hickok. Their father was J.C. Frewen, who taught in a country school built of sod, accepting food in lieu of a salary. Lucy became Mrs. Knox in 1910 and her husband practiced medicine in Norcatur until 1921 when they moved to McCook. After her husband's death in 1945 she moved to Boston where she divides her time between two sons, Dr. W.E. Knox III and Dr. Hertzler Knox.
