Celebrate Recovery at the Oberlin Community Fellowship

According to a brochure published by Northwest Kansas Domestic & Sexual Violence Services, Inc., (800) 794-4624, titled Domestic Violence Survivor/ Victim Handbook; "Domestic violence is a pattern of abusive and threatening behaviors that may include physical, emotional, economic, and sexual violence as well as intimidation, isolation, and coercion. This intentional behavior occurs among intimate partners and can be physically and psychologically damaging."

Fact 1: Domestic violence crosses all ages, ethnicities, economic classes, religions, and educational levels.

Fact 2: Only the batterer can stop the violence. Battering is an attitude and chosen behavior.

Fact 3: Unemployment, financial problems, substance abuse and other stresses are good excuses for abuse, but not the cause. Many people have these stresses and do not batter. Abusers will use any excuse to justify their behavior.

Isolation: Controlling what she does, who she sees, limiting her outside involvement, jealousy game.

Denying, Minimizing and blaming: Making light of abuse, ignoring abuse, saying she caused it.

Children: Using children to relay messages, using visitation to harass her, threatens to take children away

Male Privilege: Threatening her as a servant, acting like a master, strictly defines a woman's role.

Economic Abuse: Prevents her from working, making her ask for money, taking her money.

Coercion and threats: threatening to leave, hurt or report her, threats of suicide for her to drop any charges.

If you are the victim of abuse or battering, seek help immediately. Keep in mind this warning included in the domestic violence brochure: When abusers feel a loss of control – such as when victims try to leave them - the abuse can escalate. Safety is essential
