# Boys lose **20-14** Cowboys

### outgun Red Devils

The Oberlin-Goodland football game was close and exciting Friday night, but in the end it was the visiting Cowboys who jumped for joy after beating the hometown Red Devils 20-14,

It was Goodland's second victory and Oberlin's second loss.

The game left the Decatur Community High team with a 4-2 record, with victories over WaKeeney, Osborne, Plainville and Atwood and losses to Norton and Goodland.

The Cowboys kicked off, but on the third down, the visitors intercepted an Oberlin pass and took over on the Oberlin 27.

Oberlin almost took the ball back on a pass but couldn't quite hang on, and Goodland took the ball to the 14 for a first and 10. A delay-of-game penalty sent the Cowboys back to the 19. However, the Cowboys used a pass and a couple of runs to make first and goal on the 6. Two more plays put the ball in the end zone.

The two-point conversion was good, and the score was 8-0 Goodland with 8 minutes left to play in the first quarter.

Oberlin took the kickoff on its own 25. However, three plays later the Red Devils had only moved the ball four yards. They punted it out of bounds on the Goodland 43.

Goodland didn't have a good series, however, as a holding penalty pushed them back to second and 12 and then Oberlin's Josh Ritter sacked the quarterback. The Cowboys were now at third and 25 and a delay-of-game call put them at third and 30. And incomplete pass forced them to punt the ball away with 5:09 left to play in the quarter.

Oberlin took over on its own 36. Quarterback Wiley Farr unloaded a long pass to Toby Peters and Oberlin was first and 10 on the Goodland side of the 50. A pass was knocked down by Goodland, then Farr ran to take the Red Devils to third and gave Oberlin another first and 10 to punt. on the Goodland 32.

A 33-yard pass to Peters gave the Red Devils a touchdown. The twopoint conversion was yet another pass from Farr to Peters and the score was tied at 8 with 3:37 left in the first quarter.

Goodland took the kickoff on its own 41 but was forced to punt after getting to third and one. An illegal procedure call and an incomplete pass put the Cowboys at fourth and

Oberlin took the punt on its own 19. A personal foul on a Goodland player got the player yelled at by his coach and Oberlin a trip to the 35. An incomplete pass, lack of running room and a quarterback sack put Oberlin back to fourth and 18.

The teams lined up for the punt but Oberlin faked and almost – but not quite – made the 18 yards.

The association gives out team rankings each week after the coaches call in their statistics on Monday.

In preseason rankings, Oberlin was fourth in Class 2A. By Week 1, they had moved up to No. 2. On Week 3, they were ranked No. 1, a spot they have held onto for three, going on four weeks. The last rankings available are

for Week 5, which ended Monday, Oct. 5. At that time The Decatur Community High Lady Red Devils were 23-1. Since then they have increased their record to 26-1 with victories over Brewster, Goodland and Atwood. On Week 5, Uniontown, 21-1,
