## Students choose items

food.
The 181 students at Oberlin Elementary School get lunch Monday the first group arriving in the cafeteria at 11:25 a.m. and the second at 11:55 a.m. The kindergarten through third graders eat in the first shift, followed by fourth through sixth grade.
Last Friday, the main course was the chicken with milk, salad, fruit and vegetables.
The kids do get some choices on what they want toeat, said Principal Duane Dorshorst.They are required to pick a minimum of three different servings, although those don'thave to be from different food groups. count as one serving.
One of the reasons the students get to choose, said Mr. Dorshorst, is it helps them learn how to make healthy choices. By letting the kids choose, he said, they are more likely to eat what they take. That helps the district cut back on waste.
Teachers and staff, including

Administrative AssistantMardiLo hoefener, walk around the cafeteri making sure the students eat and that everything runs smoothly. After lunch, the kids geta 20 -min ute recess before heading back to class.
Meals served at the grade school are cooked at Decatur Community
High School, then driven across High School, then driven across
town in the district's yellow van. The schools' cafeteria staff normally serves 175 lunches a day, Mr. Dorshorst said.
