In February, he transferred to the Army Air Force, completed Bombardier March 27, 1943. After completing navigation training he was awarded Navigation Wings in Hondo, Texas. Glenn served as Lead Navigator Ninth Air Force European Theatre and flew 56 missions in a B-26 medium bombardment group.

He was the recipient of the French Croix de Guerre with Palm by President of the French Provisional Government, dated Sept. 17, 1946. He was also awarded an Air Medal with 12 bronze clusters, Distinguished Flying Cross, Purple Heart and two overseas bars. Campaign participations were Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes and Air Force Offensive in Europe. He separated from service in December
