School board decides not to join lawsuit

funding.

Superintendent Duane Dorshorst told board members about the approaching lawsuit at their October meeting, but the board made no decision then.

It would cost the district \$2 per student to join Schools for Fair Funding, a total of about \$774. If a lawsuit is filed, however, that would go up to \$5 per student, or \$1,935.

The group won a lawsuit against the state in 2005, forcing the Legis-

cided last Monday not to join other was supposed to get \$4,492 and Kansas school districts in suing ended up actually getting \$4,218, state lawmakers for not living up to which probably will still be cut. So an agreement which ended a state far, nearly \$100 million of that gain Supreme Court case on school has been lost to budget cuts this year, however, with another round of cuts are expected as state tax revenue lags behind projections.

Mr. Dorshorst said he agreed the Legislature isn't funding Kansas schools at the level it promised, but is suing the state the way to get something done?

The Legislature has been sued four times, said Mr. Dorshorst, and each time the amount of spending per pupil increased.

Member Abby Hissong said she agreed not to join in the lawsuit.

Although no vote was needed, the board members came to a consensus not to join Schools for Fair Funding or the lawsuit.

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


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
