Nearly 250 lives could be saved with the blood collected at the Fourth Annual Decatur Community High School Blood Drive held on Nov. 11, at the high school gym.

The Oberlin Student Council, National Honor Society and FFA organized and volunteered at the event, starting at 7 a.m. and ending around 4:30 p.m.

Stuco and NHS members worked as receptionists and donor escorts and also helped the Red Cross set up and tear down.

The FFA members prepared the

food, including chili and sandwiches, and manned the canteen all day.

Twenty people gave blood for the first time, most of whom were Oberlin students. Donors have to be 17 years old, but anyone 16 can give blood as long as they have permission from a parent.

Eighty pints of blood were collected, which met the goal of 80 set by the Red Cross.
