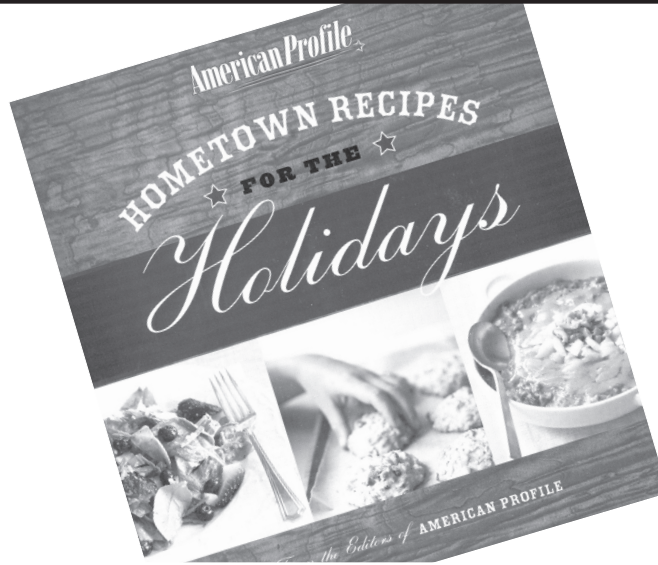
Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program
