Cottonwood Ranch could reopen soon

The Kansas State Historical Society and the Friends of Cottonwood Ranch are working on an agreement to open the Cottonwood Ranch State Historic Site to the public in early

The site will be open for the tourist season, but continue to be open for self-guided tours of the grounds year-around. Exterior signs will tell the history of the ranch and will be installed soon. The Historical Society will continue to be involved in the long-term preservation and maintenance, while the Friends will operate the site.

The site is a relatively unchanged rural ranch near the South Fork of the Solomon River.
