Choosing, using asparagus Seeing fresh asparagus in markets signals spring, yet shoppers who

didn't grow up eating asparagus may pass it by — and miss out on one of the season's best vegetables.

Choosing and using fresh asparagus is easy. Here are some tips, beginning with how to choose fresh

- Look for firm stalks with a rich green or violet-green color.
- Larger stalks typically offer the best flavor and quality; a thinner stalk can indicate toughness or lateseason growth.
- Tips should be tightly closed. An open head happens when the weather warms and the head grows

With white asparagus, other than color, the same tips apply. White asparagus is grown in low light, which does not allow it to absorb chlorophyll, which is responsible for the green color. The appearance is different, but the taste is

To store fresh asparagus:

• Refrigerate after purchase. Trim side dishes. In many recipes, asparathe stem and wrap the bottom in a the bottom to keep the stalks moist and fresh.

• Use fresh asparagus within two to three days after purchase.

To cook fresh asparagus:

- Separate and, with a soft vegetable brush, wash each stalk under cool running water.
- Check the head of each stalk for garden debris.
- Snap (or cut) off the bottom inch, which can be tough.

Fresh asparagus can be eaten raw or incorporated into salads, sandwich fillings, casseroles, and other 475-8121.

gus can usually be substituted for damp paper towel or stand up the peas or broccoli. Cook whole stalks stalks in a jar with enough water in or cut pieces of asparagus to steam, stir-fry, oven-roast, microwave or grill. Cook until crisp-tender.

Nutritionally, asparagus is low in calories and high in fiber, potassium, folic acid, Thiamine and Vitamin A, C, and B6.




