City Administrator Austin Gilley said he had looked at options for how to pay for the wall. He said he didn't think debt financing, such as a bond issue, would work. There is money in the general fund, he said, moved forward from a cash balance from the previous year. Otherwise, agreed.

> Another idea is to put the wall off and budget it for 2011, he added, noting that the city has just under \$29,000 in memorial money which could be used.

City Administrator Austin Gilley said he wants to make sure that the city doesn't bankrupt itself while doing the around \$4 million watertreatment project. Although it's primarily because of the water project, he added, the city can use the service with other financial matters.

Mr. Gilley said the final stages of the loan paperwork for the treatment plant are about done. Hopefully, he said, the engineer's final specifications will also be done in the next

In June, the council will look at issuing revenue or general obligation bonds, allowing the city to borrow money to build the plant. For a utility project, said Mr. Gilley, a vote isn't required to allow the city to borrow the money.

Revenue bonds wouldn't count against the city's debt limit, he added. They would be paid back through water income. However, there is a 15-day waiting period so voters can protest. That could send the issue to an election.

Most owners who received "nuisance" letters about their property, said Mr. Gilley, are taking care of the problems, but one or two plan to appeal to the city's minimum housing board. That group will need to meet soon, he said.

The city might want to seek bids for clean-up or demolition services.

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
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
