125 YEARS AGO – July 1885
The southern Cheyennes are becoming restless and threaten an outbreak.
Our neighbor, August Pollnow, has put up one of the Vaneless Monitor windmills on his farm.
J.R. Neal is putting up a business building just north of the skating rink which will be 24x60.
The Lincoln Land Company laid off the north part of the Isaac Cole homestead as an addition to the town of Oberlin last week.
Jennings: F.H. Cornish died at a St. Joe Hospital on June 19th.
The band boys received their instruments last week. They are in tune and finish just as good as new. No one would ever suspect they had once been ground through a cyclone mill.

100 YEARS AGO – July 1910
A special train will run to Norton July 4th, leaving Oberlin at 7 a.m.
J.J. Jackson is having his office building and coal bins moved down to the railroad close to the old Co-op Elevator which he recently purchased.
J.P. Noble of Atwood recently purchased the S.A. Welstead brick home in north Oberlin. Mr. Noble will move his family here in time for school.
Irving Cook, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Cook, arrived home Saturday from Ann Arbor, Mich., where he had just graduated from Michigan University, specializing in forestry work. He will soon leave for the State of Washington to enter the forestry service of Uncle Sam.

75 YEARS AGO – July 1935
With neither the harvest nor inclement weather to interfere, Oberlin's Fourth of July celebration attracted one of the largest crowds in recent years. With a seeming total disregard for the sweltering rays of Old Sol which sent the temperature to 98 degrees, ball games and the swimming pool kept people busy in the afternoon. Quite a number of air-minded folks took flights over the city in a plane recently acquired by Joe Martin who had an aviator here taking passengers for short rides at one dollar per. The band concert and fireworks provided restful evening entertainment.

50 YEARS AGO – July 1960
Idle combines were a common sight this week as custom cutters bided their time, waiting for favorable weather. Atley Muirhead in Custer Township reportedly had a field which made 54 bushels to the acre with a 64-pound testweight and Fred Zwodow, who farms west of Selden, reported a 50-bushel yield on a 50-acre field of Wichita variety which had a 64-pound testweight. Most elevator operators reported that 40 bushels had been a typical yield with some running into the 50s.
In an endeavor to eliminate the dread disease polio, a free immunization clinic has been scheduled for Thursday, July 14, at the Oberlin American Legion by Joe Pollara, administrator of Decatur County Hospital. There is no charge and it is recommended that those up to age 50 who have not had the regular four shots should do so and those who have had four shots and not had one in the past year should receive the fifth shot.
In the annual Lions Club drawing Saturday night druggist Charles Stevenson won the riding lawn mower and librarian Mrs. Harold Brown won the portable TV set. The lawn ensemble went to Cecil Clingman of Peru, Ind., the sound man for the recent Diamond Jubilee celebration.
Funeral services were held at Lund Covenant Church for Mabel Piel, 81, who operated the Lund switchboard for a number of years and was the Lund correspondent for The Herald for a number of years. She had made her home with her sister, Bessie Alstrom.

25 YEARS AGO – July 1985
Wheat harvest continues in Decatur County with some yields in the 50-60 bushel range but a few in the 10-bushel range due to weed and cheat problems. Area elevator operators estimate that about half the crop is in the bin with plenty of storage left as cars are being loaded out daily.
A hot bearing on a combine is believed to be the cause of a blaze along the Sheridan-Decatur county lines south of Allison with about 1,500 acres destroyed including 100 acres of uncut wheat.
Warren Bainter, 36, took over as president of Oberlin Rotary Club on July 1 replacing Jack Metcalf. The Bainter family moved to Oberlin in 1981 from Colby where he had been associated with Paul Steele, a CPA firm. He is a partner of Arthur J.
