Bridge repair begins west of Norton on K-383

Work was to begin Monday to repair the bridge on K-383 over the Prairie Dog Creek and the west end of Sebelius Lake about 3.5 miles south of the U.S. 36 junction west of Norton.

The contractor, PCIRoads LLC, of St. Michael, Minn., was to start setting up traffic control signs and

lights on Monday, said Harold Schleicher, area engineer for the Kansas Department of Transportation in Phillipsburg. Traffic will be confined to one lane of the bridge while crews work on the other, he said, and drivers can expect delays of up to five minutes. Signals will control use of the bridge.

"The main emphasis of the project is to repair the expansion joint on the south end of the bridge," Schleicher said. "The work also entails a polymer overlay, which is a good seal to help prevent salt corrosion from deteriorating the bridge deck."

"As always, we ask that the pub-

lic exercise caution while driving through any road work zone in Kansas," said Kristen Brands of Almena, district public affairs manager for the department.

Brands said the estimated cost of the job is \$133,000. Work is to be complete, weather permitting, by Oct. 22.

Deadline nears for small grain crops

Farmers have until Wednesday, Sept. 1, to obtain a Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance policy for small grain crops that will be grazed during the 2011 program year, says Diane Barrett, county executive

director for the U.S. Farm Service Agency.

Crops eligible for this coverage those that are not insurable in the county. To remain eligible for the Livestock Forage Program, all crops

that will be grazed must have some level of insurance. The Noninsured Assistance Program offers coverage for those crops that are not covered through private companies.

The administrative service fee is \$250 per crop in each county, not to exceed \$750 per producer per county or \$1,875 maximum overall. Farmers must pay the fee and sign an application by the deadline.
