Parenting 401—Preparing to Fly By Pastor Doug Mason, Lund Covenant Church, Oberlin

One of the scariest parts of being a parent is when a child graduates from high school and leaves home, whether to college, a job, or the military. The parents fear bad influence, bad decisions, immaturity, and many other possibilities. After all, we all hear the stories about the keg parties, and the wild living that goes on during those years. Statistically, most college-age students stop going to church. But we parents are not there to do anything about it. We are no longer making their decisions. The "what if" thinking starts. What if she gets into the wrong crowd? What if he doesn't study? What if – what if – what if.

We all have free will. We make our own choices. Even the best intentioned parents often find their kids rejecting everything they taught when they were younger. So no situation guarantees your child will do what's right. But here is something I've noticed. Parents that don't prepare their children for that stage often find their children going erratic. They get away from home and lose all sense of control. The reason is that they weren't prepared for that sudden freedom.

In previous articles I talked about the importance of parental control. Parents need to put limits on their kids. But as time goes on these teens must be given small amounts of freedom where their level of responsibility can be overseen. There needs to be increasing freedoms as they approach college. If these teens never experienced any freedom they are more likely to grab at as much as they can, regardless of the consequences.

pilot doesn't just get put in the pilot seat. He/she needs to learn how to be a pilot and then needs practice. You

don't just start flying or you'll crash.

One concern I have along this line is the lack of financial responsibility teens have today. They need to be making car and/or insurance payments. They need to balance a checkbook. Too often now they spend all their time with extra-curricular activities and never learn the value of a dollar. They never learn the discipline of a job.

I used to be a college recruiter and an educational consultant. I see more and more parents shouldering the college bill. Why? There is no law saying it's your responsibility. You can help, sure, but all of it? No, you are doing a disfavor to your child.

Also, when learning to fly, you need to see if you can trust your child on his/her own. They need the practice of being at the controls. Leave for the weekend or even a week their junior/senior year and see how they do. (By the way, you may want to have someone keeping an eye on them secretly.) Trust them on out-of-town ventures. Don't be stupid and let them go with idiots to party in a college town, but let them experience some small levels of freedom so that the experience isn't totally new. As they earn trust, give them more. It's quite the balancing act, but it's important all the
