

This is a voluntary program designed to help restore overused aquifers and streams in critical A Service of Holy Communion areas. The Prairie Dog Creek Basin has been selected as a pilot project target area because it is significant in the efforts of Kansas to maintain compliance with the Republican River compact.

Applicants will be compensated in exchange for the permanent retirement of a water right. Priority is given to retiring water rights in areas which would have the greatest impact on the stream system.
