Veterinarian reappointed to board

Gov. Mark Parkinson has reappointed Dr. Mark Olson to a second term on the Kansas Board of Veterinary Examiners until June 30, 2014.

Dr. Olson was appointed by Gov. Kathleen Sebelius in 2006.

The seven-member board, which includes six veterinarians and one nonveterinary member, oversees licensing of all Kansas veterinarians, plus registration of all veterinary clinics and licensed veterinary technicians. Members work with legislators in the House and Senate on issues that involve veterinary

medicine and practice.

Dr. Olson is a mixed-animal practitioner with Countryside Veterinary Clinic of Oberlin and Hoxie. He has been in mixed-animal practice since 1982 and at Countryside since 1987.

He graduated from Decatur Community High School in 1976 and earned a Bachelor of Science in agriculture in 1980 from Kansas State University. He received his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree from K-State in 1982.


