Young man dies in wreck on country road

found dead in a corn field last Tuesday after his pickup apparently rolled, ejecting him into the field.

Trooper Ronny Boyd of the Kansas Highway Patrol said while it appears that alcohol was a factor in the accident that killed Eric Farr, but the lab report has not come back.

The trooper said he didn't calculate the speed, but it appears with what happened and with the condition of the road, speed was also a factor.

Trooper Boyd, from Oakley, wrote the report on the accident scene last Tuesday morning, although he wasn't the first law enforcement officer on the scene.

Decatur County Undersheriff Allen Marcum said he was the first to arrive after one or more calls came into the dispatch office just after 9 a.m. that there was a truck in a corn field on the Bohemian Hall Road about a mile and a half west of the Jennings Road.

He said he went out to the site and found Mr. Farr, who had been thrown from his 2004 Ford pickup. An ambulance was called, but the victim was pronounced dead at the scene.

A 25-year-old Clayton man was the patrol is called in. The troopers have the technical equipment and training to do a lot of the tests, measuring the speed and figuring out what happened.

The undersheriff said it appeared that the truck had rolled and Mr. Farr was thrown out. He was dead when officers arrived.

"It was a simple deal with a tragic ending," he said.

The truck was probably out from the road 10 to 12 rows in the corn, he said.

Trooper Boyd said he placed the time of the accident around 4:15 a.m. Mr. Farr was last seen at 3:30 a.m. at his older brother's house in Oberlin. He added that there's no way to pinpoint the exact time.

Mr. Farr was eastbound on County Road 430, the Hall Road, when he lost control of his truck on the right edge of the road, the trooper said. The driver over corrected and got the truck back to the left side, then the center of the road. He over corrected again and went into the north ditch. The vehicle overturned and Mr. Farr was ejected.
