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A double homicide in California has reached into the Norton area, where a niece of the victims

On Christmas night, San Luis Obispo County sheriff's deputies were summoned to the Santa Margarita Ranch, where two sisters had been shot to death.

Beverly Reilly, 64, and her sister, Kathy Yeager, 61, were the victims of what authorities are describing as a random act by a young man who was not taking prescribed medicines.

Dennis Reilly, 70, Beverly's husband. was the only survivor. According to the San Luis Obispo Tribune, a family member, John Evans, retold this account he had received from Mr. Reilly:
