Board waives **90-day notice** for boys home

The Oberlin School Board agreed last week to waive the 90-day notice normally required for placing juveniles from a facility here in the school.

At a board meeting last Monday, Superintendent Duane Dorshorst said King's Treatment Center contacted him because the company plans to open a home up in Oberlin again using the Boys Town model with house parents. They are planning for seven boys from 12 to 18 living in the home and attending Oberlin schools.

They normally would have to give the district 90 day notice, said Mr. Dorshorst, before the kids can be enrolled. He said they are asking for a waiver, and he agreed.

The board unanimously approved waiving the notice. Mr. Dorshorst didn't say when the kids will start arriving at the 180 House, which is on Elk Avenue. He said he knew the house parents were supposed to be here or had just arrived.

King's Treatment operated the 180 House once before, using an employee model, not house parents.

Board member Dan Wasson said he went to a Northwest Kansas Technical College meeting and learned that the college has had 15 inquiries from international students for enrollment for next year.

The college, he said, has changed some general education requirements to allow students to earn credits for work experience.

He said the school is looking for a 60-passenger athletic bus, as they have students signed up for sports. In other business, the board:

Notice of Personal **Property Assessment**

Personal property renditions must be filed between January 1 and March 15. Renditions filed after March 15 will have a penalty for late filing. Taxable personal property includes: Business and shop equipment, computers and printer, boats, motor and trailers, aircraft, mobile homes, camping and travel trailers, flatbed and car trailers, mopeds, ATV's, golf cars, trucks, non-tagged and non-highway vehicles and improvements on leased land.

The Decatur County Appraiser's Office need to be notified of the sale of any personal property during 2009. All taxpayers must file before the March 15 deadline.

All new businesses in Decatur County are required to contact the Decatur County Appraiser's Office to report business equipment for tax purposes.

If you have no personal property to report please call us to verify that you are in the county for census purposes.
