Grocery items are smaller

Observant shoppers have probably noticed that many grocery items have become smaller recently. While packages are smaller, the cost is either the same or higher.

Why the change? Manufacturers say rising transportation costs and increasing ingredient and manufacturing costs have caused the change. While the smaller size is obvious in some products, in others it is not. An example is adding an indentation to the bottom of plastic bottles. Another example is using thinner plastic wraps to hold multiple items together.

So what can a shopper do? Here are some tips:

Compare brands. Some manufacturers are not changing package sizes. Compare unit prices posted on

store shelves. Promotions can

change price per ounce or price

per sheet. Switch to store brands. Many are comparable or even better in quality than national brands. They are also 25 - 30 % cheaper.

Buy in bulk when it makes sense. Look for sales on bulk items to save money.

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


