
It's Miraculous Kevin Schnakenberg, St. John's Lutheran

When something extraordinary occurs it is common secretly "buried." Then as Jesus would pass by the for people to say, "It's miraculous!" As of this writing, the word "miraculous" is being used by doctors, headline writers, and the general public to describe the recovery of U.S. congresswoman Gabrielle Giffords after being shot in the head at virtually pointblank range this past Jan. 8. It seems miraculous in and of itself that she escaped death. But not only that, she was taken off the ventilator a week after the shooting. Since then some of the things she's been able to do are; keep her eyes open for 15 minutes at a time; move her legs and hands; dangle her feet over the bed; jiggle her ring; and she reach up and touch her husband's face and rub his neck. Just a day short of two weeks after the tragic day she was moved from the hospital to rehabilitation center.

God can still do some amazing things, even though some may scoff. Throughout time people have disnissed God's work. Robert Ingersoll, a famous atheist of some decades ago, traveled widely across the of eternal death for us on the cross, and through His country, lecturing to large groups of people. It is said that at one time he sought to show how Jesus' raising Lazarus from the dead was just a trick to bolster Jesus' waning fortunes. Because if He had not said 'Lazarus' he would have had the whole graveyard of Bethany coming out to Him!"

As miraculous as the raising of Lazarus was, the whole graveyard coming forth would have been some miraculous sight! 
