75 YEARS AGO — April 1936

Surpassing the hopes of their most ardent admirers, Oberlin's high school band under the direction of Bert Hostinsky, came home from the Tri-State Band contest at Enid, Oklahoma with the highest honors in Class B marching, and with six of their soloists winning firsts. Oklahoma City was highest in Class A. The judges included Dr. Edwin

Franko Goldman of New York City and Dr. Frank Simon of Cincinnati, two of the greatest band masters in the world. "These are the finest high school bands in America, the finest I've ever heard," Dr. Simon said.

Soloists ranking first were Aileen Wenger in alto vocal; Myrna Raymond, string bass; Gertrude Morrish, flute; Don Dyer, baritone; Lloyd Reist, trombone and Leonard Wegener, B-flat clarinet.

On Saturday, April 4, Mr. H. A. Stowell, the only living Civil War veteran in the county, celebrated his 93rd birthday. Born in Peoria County, Illinois, he served for more than three years in the First Peoria Battery. He was in the battle of Pea Ridge and was a gunner in the siege of Vicksburg. Before coming to Oberlin he was the superintendent of schools in Barber County and an instructor in the normal school at Medicine Lodge where the famous Carrie Nation was a student. Coming to Oberlin in 1892 he was the superintendent of schools for four years and then a bookkeeper for Campbell, Dean and Wilbur.
