

An important new alternative to traditional cardiac catheterization - transradial, or wrist, catherization is now offered by DeBakey Heart Institute and Dr. Richard Markiewicz, interventional cardiologist.

For patients who meet the criteria, Dr. Markiewicz uses the radial artery, located in the wrist, as the access point for catheterization procedures rather than the femoral artery in the groin.
