Museum displays change over winter

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Things have changed at the Last Indian Raid Museum over the winter.

Director Sharleen Wurm said some things moved, others were added and some sections were enlarged.

The Decatur Community High School alumni section was moved from the back of the main building toward the middle area and enlarged. The section includes pictures of Decatur Community High and Decatur County High classes, band uniforms, memorabilia and more.

Mrs. Wurm said they took the bank section out of the front and moved it to the second annex.

The parlor has been enlarged, she said, which allows for more seating area. The parlor can be used in the evenings for \$25, but during the day, groups and organizations are welcome to use it at no charge.

The museum will soon be a hot spot for wireless Internet, she said.

They also added to the towns and community section with lots of pictures on digital frames. There are lots of ghost towns in Decatur County, she noted.

There are still a lot of pictures that no one has been able to identify. Many have now been put on digital frames, so, hopefully, someone can identify them.

Other changes have been made in the quilt room and kitchen and some of the items which have been in storage are now being used.

The gift shop has been totally re-decorated and now looks like a gift shop, said Mrs. Wurm. Some area home-owned businesses have displays in the gift shop, including
