Group wants to move sign at Sappa Park

Oberlin Convention and Visitors Bureau members talked at their meeting last Thursday about moving the sign for the Last Indian Raid Museum at the entrance to Sappa Park farther east to make room for a sign marking the park for westbound traffic.

Member Gary Anderson said the sign for it is on the back side of the Sappa Park sign, so it can be seen by people traveling west on U.S. 36. He suggested moving the museum part of the sign to the east end of cityowned land along the highway.

That ground, to the end of the cedar trees, is leased by Pheasants Forever, he said. If the museum sign is moved, then a Sappa Park sign could be put on both sides of the existing structure, Mr. Ander-

Mr. Anderson said they would need to write Pheasants Forever to seek approval to move the sign, then talk to the state Department of Transportation, since the location is along a federal highway.


