Keep your picnic food safe

Picnic and barbecue season offers lots of opportunities for outdoor fun with family and friends, but these warm weather events also present opportunities for food borne bacteria to thrive. As food heats up in summer temperatures, bacteria multiply rapidly.

To protect yourself, your family, and friends from food borne illness during warm-weather months, safe food handling when eating outdoors is critical. Practice simple food safety guidelines for transporting your food to the picnic site, and preparing and serving it safely once you've arrived.

Food safety begins with proper hand cleaning, including outdoor settings. Before you begin setting out your picnic feast, make sure hands and surfaces are clean.

Outdoor Hand Cleaning: If you don't have access to running water, simply use a water jug, some soap and paper towels. Or, consider using moist disposable towelettes for cleaning your hands.

Utensils and Serving Dishes: Take care to keep all utensils and platters clean when preparing

Don't you love it when something that has been answered. Of course we cannot put words in God's hidden is revealed? That's the way it is with the passage I've selected for the subject of this article, I Chronicles 4: 9-10, better known as The Prayer of Jabez. However, I warn you, when you go looking for it in the book of Chronicles, you will wonder what in the world I am talking about. This little gem is hidden in chapters and chapters of genealogy. It just pops out at you but have no doubt, it is one of the most powerful tools in Scripture.

Here is what that little prayer says, from the New Revised Standard Version, beginning with verse 9, in chapter 4," Jabez was honored more than his brothers; and his mother named him Jabez saying, 'Because I bore him in pain.' Jabez called on the God of Israel, saying, "Oh that you would bless me and enlarge my border, and that your hand might be with me, and that you would keep me from hurt and harm!" And God granted what he asked."

By the time this article goes to press, the high school seniors will have walked across the stage and received their diplomas. Little do they yet realize that their lives will never be the same.

Graduation from high school is indeed a very shining moment, but all too soon, does it dawn that something is very different, some line has been crossed and there is no going back. Adulthood comes slamming down like a record wave in a Tsunami.! Knowing how to pray, or building strength in that skill, is the best gift that a graduate can receive.

Sadly, many young men and women today do not have roots that teether them to hope and strength that a look at it, go to the Bible, a wonderful handbook by is realized in a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. the way for when Mom and Dad aren't at your elbow Prayer is the transmission line that feeds directly to answer questions. mouth, but we can believe that bringing our burdens to God's ear, will absolutely get answers. But be aware, that God's answer may blow you away, because he can see the BIG picture for us and will give us answers that will be the best for us.

There are four parts to this little prayer. First, Jabez asked that God bless him. Second, he prayed that God would enlarge his territory. Third, he asked that God's hand would be upon him. Last, he prayed that God would keep him from evil. Actually there are some differences in how the last request is interpreted. The New King James version put it this way, "Keep me from evil that I might not cause pain."

A blessing in this age is usually not sought. It goes against the thinking in our culture that we ask for God's blessing on ourselves, not others, but God WANTS to bless each of us. It is more to this culture that we want our territory expanded so that we can control more, but that is not what it says either. Jabez is asking for the gifts needed to be a better leader. God wants to increase our responsibilities toward others. It help us grow. To ask for God's hand on us demonstrates our knowledge of God's awesome power. He can do in our lives what we alone, CAN'T.

The last request is perhaps the most important, to keep us all from evil, so that we would not cause pain to others, NOT CAUSE PAIN TO OTHERS! In our "me first" culture, that is a biggie!

So, young people, though this is not a one sentence tweet, I hope your parents will request that you have into our great source of help...our God. There will be wherever you may go. You'll find yourself opening

> May your prayers be that God will make YOUR LIFE A BLESSING TO OTHERS! May He increase your sense of responsibility to others, may He have his hand upon you, and May He keep you safe in the midst of the many evils in the world around you.
