Ted Seavey and wife got caught in the storm while coming home from Fred Wheeland's in Summit Township and drove up beside the Willcoxon schoolhouse to get some protection from the storm. Lightning hit the building and knocked his team down and Ted cut the harness straps to get his team up after the storm but the harness was so spoiled he couldn't drive home.

Construction of the dam is expected to form a lake of approximately 160 acres
