'So what you are saying is the water is there, but the quantity is an issue?" asked Mayor Bill Riedel.

Quantity isn't an issue, said Mr. Miller; it would just take several wells to produce the same amount and pipe them all into town.

He said there was some quantity issues with a well to the south, but it could still be done. It might take 10 wells, but it would mean less pipe.

While the water rights could be transferred from an irrigation well, he said, the well itself can't be used as a municipal well. A new well would need to be drilled.

The council approved starting the needed waiver to pursue finding looking for more water and having Miller work up some cost estimates. Mr. Miller said he would hold off on the water.

those until additional samples have been taken.

Mr. Miller asked what the council wants to do about the distribution lines which are supposed to be part of the coming project. The lines move the water through the town. He said he thinks it will cost \$600,000 to \$800,000 for that part of the job.

The council decided to wait to get bid packages out on the lines just in case additional money is needed to build a pipeline to move water

In Atwood, said Mr. Miller, they did four wells and a pipeline at 14 miles. It cost around \$4 million, or about the same as a treatment plant. However, the plant could cost the water. The council also approved city \$100,000 a year or more to operate, including the cost of getting rid of the uranium taken out of
