This Wednesday was Alzheimer's Awareness Day, and everyone was encouraged to wear purple in recognition of this disease and the unwavering devotion to research being done to fight it. It was Buffet Day so everyone ate together, staff and residents were dressed in varying shades of purple making Town Square a lovely sea of purple.

Many of our residents cannot form new or short-term memories. The disease process has robbed them of that ability. One woman might repeatedly ask, "What time is it?" or "What is your name?" She cannot remember the answer you gave her just minutes before. Yet while sitting at a table filled with hats she may begin to talk about wearing a hat to church every Sunday. Telling detailed stories about a special hat bought for a particular occasion. Her long-term memory is still intact but after leaving she won't remember being there at all.

Other residents with dementia don't recognize their own children; their long-term memory has failed. Yesterday holds no comfort for them because they can't remember, and tomorrow is not promised... for no one knows when the Lord will call us home. The words of Dad Hoeger begin to take on new meaning for us who are caretakers....we only have today! For loved ones with

advanced dementia we only have moments within the day. What a joy and a privilege then for us who spend every day with them to take advantage of every moment. It has been proven that even if they can't remember who we are, they remember how we make them feel.
