Nothing can keep us from God's love The Rev. Linda Willey, **Oberlin United Methodist Church**

I have few personal memories of the time when are we; they were trying to figure out exactly what it Gerald Ford was president, but I do remember hearing a lot about the work of his late wife Betty, who passed away on July 8.

She was known for her work and outspoken advocacy for those suffering from addictions, as well as breast cancer; two conditions she struggled with during her lifetime.

I was fascinated by the coverage of her life in the days following her death, and how she seemed to operate in a time of give and take that no longer exists. I did not watch the broadcast of her funeral, but I

was struck by a friend's summary of one of the eulogies, with some personal reflections.

viewpoints could come together with some commonality and compromise. The greater good was found "Now, we are fostering ideological, political war-

fare ... Warfare is different from debate and argument ... Warfare, by necessity, calls for one to dehumanize one's opponent, because the objective becomes 'to take them out'rather than persuade or find some common ground upon which to move forward."

These are indeed anxious times. They may even be as anxious as the times in which the Apostle Paul wrote to the church in Rome. We are a lot like those old Romans: they were trying to figure out the difference the gospel made in their everyday lives, and so fore we began, I was not expecting quite that many!

meant to be Christian, and so are we; they struggled with a lot of social, political, and economic issues, including concerns about safety and security, and Romans 8:38-39 is Paul's answer to all the anxiety

"And I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. Neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither our fears for today nor our worries about tomorrow – not even the powers of hell can separate us from God's love. No power in the sky above or in the earth below – indeed, nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from He said, "Cokie Roberts' remarks ... recalled a the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our time when political opponents with vastly differing Lord." (New Living Translation)

Such conviction can keep us safe from warfare, from the temptation to demonize our opponents, or take them out. When we have such confidence in God's love, we can let go of the need to turn those with whom we disagree into enemies, and instead see them as people God loves as much as God love us.

"Is it bad not to be baptized? Do you have to go to church to be a member? Why do people of different religions fight? Do you have to be baptized in public? What's the deal with the pope?"

Those were some of the questions I heard at the first meeting of our confirmation class last month. When I asked the youths if they had any initial questions be-


