125 YEARS AGO — Oct. 1886

The U.S. Land Office has been removed to rooms over B.S. Foster's furniture store. The room vacated will be used as a flour and feed store.

Geo. Keys has resigned his position with the Equitable Mortgage Company and will soon be in business for himself as a real estate agent.

The county commissioners have contracted with the Cincinnati Safe and Lock Co., for two cells, 14x11x7, which together with the corridor will be capable of holding 16 prisoners. The consideration is \$2500.

Udo Drath and Miss Eva Zwickle were married last Saturday at the home of Mr. Drath's parents in Herndon. Udo is one of the earliest settlers in the county and has a wide circle of friends who wish him and his bride every prosperity and happiness.

100 YEARS AGO — Oct. 1911

The recent fine rains have put the soil in fine shape for wheat sowing.

75 YEARS AGO — Oct. 1936

Much work has been done at Sappa State Park as a cooperative project by the National Park Service, the Dept. of Interior and the WPA and it is becoming more and more evident that some day it will offer the people of Southwest Nebraska and Northwest Kansas a beautiful and useful park area.

One of the many projects is the picnic area immediately below the site of the dam which is shaded by native trees and has camp stoves, tables and benches built of native lumber and car parking space.

Decatur's first league loss of the football season was dealt by the St. Francis Indians with a 54-7 massacre.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Knutson and Rex is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Cozad. The couple plan to start housekeeping in an apartment in his grandfather's house, the W.P. Smith home at Lyle, and he will farm with his father.

50 YEARS AGO — Oct. 1961

The unexpected death of George Nellans, 67, who had served as probate judge of Decatur County since 1944, came as a shock to the entire community. He came to Decatur County with his parents at

the age of three to a farmstead near Jennings where he lived until 1920 when he was elected county clerk. During World War I he served as a machine gunner with an infantry unit in France. He is survived by his wife, the former Miranda Parker, a son, George Parker Nellans, two grandchildren, four brothers and one sister.

In the biggest sale of land in this county in recent years eight quarter sections of land were sold in a partition action at the courthouse to settle the estate of L.P. Montgomery for the amount of \$94,300. According to L.F. Cushenbery of Cushenbery & Lund, attorneys for the heirs, the selling price of the land was exactly \$100 less than its appraised value. J.B. Powell, Oberlin, purchased 320 acres, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lake of Norcat, 320 and L.W. Montgomery of Norcat, 640.

Funeral services were held in Marysville with burial in Oberlin Cemetery for Mrs. Donald (Marguerite Roach) Williams, 41. She is survived by her husband and two daughters, Donna, 12 and Linda, 8, of Marysville and her mother, Mrs. Mike Roach, Oberlin.

Word has been received of the death of Dr. Frank Brewster, 89, of Holdrege, Neb., who operated the Benton Memorial Hospital here for many years. He had been critically ill with cancer only a few weeks after returning from a world tour.

Selden: Funeral services were held for Leonard Zodrow, 86, who managed the Farmers Union elevator for many years.

Claude Kelley, Grant Township farmer, stepped down from a stack of hay bales in his barn, missed the step and broke a rib so when he fell into the manger. 25 YEARS AGO — Oct. 1986

Cold and wet weather has hampered work on the Sappa Creek bridge on U.S. 83 and some of the asphalt work. The stretch is expected to be opened to traffic in early November if weather conditions cooperate.

Dr. Lynn Fogleman, who practiced medicine in Oberlin in 1984 and 1985 and his wife, Dr. Sharon (Goodwin) Fogleman who have practiced medicine in Waterloo, Iowa, the past year, have been accepted as missionaries by the Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church.
