sioners signed a supplemental agreement last Tuesday for a new bridge just west of Lyle that went over budget.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Tim Stallman said with a federal aid bridge, the government allows so many working days. On this bridge, he said, several half days of bad weather put the contractor over the amount of work days in the agreement, increasing the cost by \$7,235.

# **Health insurance** to remain the same

The Decatur County commissioners approved renewing the county's health insurance plan with an increase of 1.74 percent, with the county absorbing the increased cost if it's less than \$10 a month.

Randy Dicks, the county's insurance representative, said at the meeting Nov. 22 that the policy with Corporate Plan includes a separate dental plan and prescription drug card. The county has excellent health insurance, he said.

With some good years for claims, said Mr. Dicks, the increase is low. Corporate Plan, he said, had come in with the lowest rate when the county took bids.

It's up to the commissioners if

they want employees to pay the increase, he said, or just let the county absorb it.

The commissioners didn't say how much the increase would cost for each employee, and no decision

was made on who would pay. Commissioner Stan McEvoy commented that he didn't want the county's reserves to get too thin.

At the meeting last Tuesday, the commissioners discussed the insurance plan again. They agreed to have County Clerk Colleen Geihsler find out what the increase would be for each employee, and if it's under \$10, then the county would absorb the cost.
