Julie's Memory Joggers Famous Kansas People

Peggy Hull was born on a farm She left school at sixteen, got her first newspaper job on the Junction City, Kan. Sentinel, and between 1909 and 1916 worked for newspapers in Colorado, California, Hawaii, Minnesota and Ohio. In June 1917 Peggy persuaded the editor of the Morning Times to send her to France to report on World War I. She sailed for England, survived the submarine-infested Atlantic Not an easy feat, since she was without benefit of War Department accreditation, which conferred a certain government blessing on and aid to war reporters. But, no woman had ever been accredited and it was War Department policy that none ever would be. She became the first woman in the United States to become an official war reporter. She reported on several wars, including World War I and II.


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
