mercial and Highway 83 (Buffalo Avenue). How many times have you driven east into this intersection on ice, fearing sliding into the path of an 18 wheeler and be eaten alive?

"There are four streets where this could happen: They are: Commercial, Elm, Oak and Ash.

"How about trying to stop at Sappa Valley Manor No. 2 just south of Oak Street and finding you and

streets in Oberlin that have portions which are the same (hill streets): Waldo, Wolf, Elk, Buffalo, Beaver, Rodehaver, Cass, Penn, and so on across town, each has a block or two of steep slopes which are extremely dangerous.

"Also, there is the eastbound side of Commercial at Penn, shaded by the two story building on the south side of the street. Ice builds up here and is dangerous also.

"The bottom line is, can the city sand these portions of these streets to improve safety of our commu-
