Healthy Side-Lines. Add to your menu with side dishes that you've made healthier:

• Cornbread. Earn points by serving some whole grains. How? Use whole wheat flour for half of the white flour in your cornbread recipe. For less fat per serving, use fat-free plain yogurt instead of the oil called for in your recipe. • Dips. You can use fat-free plain

yogurt or fat-free sour cream instead of regular sour cream whenever you make a dip. Make a healthy move by using fresh veggie dippers or baked chips instead of regular chips.

· Leafy greens. Instead of a dressing to go with your fresh salad, serve a platter arranged with mounds of veggies, such as cooked lentils,

boiled potato pieces, whole kernel sweet corn, fresh radishes, avocado slices and bell pepper strips.

 A brownie can be an inexpensive half-time treat. Reduce the sugar in your recipe by one-third without fearing that anyone will blow a whistle! Also, use whole wheat flour for half of the white, and replace the oil with an equal amount of unsweetened applesauce.

Prophets never appreciated

"Do you recall the children's story about the Little Chicken who was walking along and something huge fell on her head and she thought the sky was falling? She wanted to warn all of her friends in the barnyard, but they wouldn't listen. They were just too busy doing their 'own thing.' Poor Chicken Little, she was having a difficult day.

There was a prophet in the Old Testament who knew a lot about those kinds of days. His name is Jeremiah. He too had red eyes and tears coursing down his cheeks. He would moan and wail until his throat was raw. He was often referred to as the "Weeping Prophet." But Jeremiah had a strong relationship with encourage the people of Israel who had been taken into captivity by Babylon.

Jeremiah had also tried to warn his people, telling them to return to God's ways or face horrible judgment. He predicted both the destruction of Jerusalem and the Jews' 70 years of captivity. How was he treated? His own countrymen threw him in prison. They beat him. Once they even threw him down a well. More than once, he wanted to quit being a prophet, but he found he couldn't; he wanted to please God, even if it was hard. Jeremiah was faithful to his call and persevered. One day, he heard a word of encouragement from the Lord:

"Do not let the prophets and mediums who are there in Babylon trick you. Do not listen to their dreams because they prophesy lies in my name...But I will bring you home again. V. 11. For I know the plans I have for you...They are plans for good and not for disaster, to give you a future and a hope. In those days when you pray, I will listen. V.13 If you look for me in earnest, you will find me when you seek me."(Jeremiah 29:8-13.).

Sometimes like Jeremiah, we too have those kinds of days. We make our plans and they seem reasonable at the time but then Bam! Life happens! All of our plans go up in smoke. Too often we lose hope in the Lord. The Lord had given him an assignment to the midst of despair when the dark clouds seem to

Yes, those times do come, but as we begin a new year of 2012, I want to remind you of the words that the Lord spoke to Jeremiah. V. 11, "For I know the plans I have for you...
