

*Council votes no on house project

(Continued from Page 1A) looked at the old youth ranch area of the park, Mayor Riedel said. The problem has always been money. They couldn't come up with the financing to make their ideas work.

Councilman Rusty Addleman said that he thought it would take a lot of money to update the old ranch buildings.

Ms. Rynearson said that she didn't have the money to renovate the house but would be relying on volunteers and donations. She said that she felt that this was what God had called her to do.

"We wouldn't ask the city for more money," she said. "It just depends on whether you want to take the risk or not."

Councilman Jim Miesner asked if she would be willing to take care of the bathrooms to be built at the shelter house.

"I'm willing to do what it takes," she replied. "I'm willing to work."

She added that she would like a decision since the project has been strung out. If the council decides not to do as she asked, she said, she had other things she could do with her time and energy.

Mrs. Farr asked about a time frame for the project. Ms. Rynearson said she hoped to have the house habitable by June.

"It's up to the Good Lord to make things gel," she said.

The mayor noted that \$4,500 was a reasonable amount for the sheet rock removal but wanted to know

who would pay for other problems that might crop up such as any possible plumbing issues.

He added that every time the council has had a project like this, the initial amount has never been enough. He noted the Sappa Lake and airport projects as examples of the city giving money, then the backers returning and asking for more as problems cropped up.

Councilman Miesner asked about workers compensation coverage for the workers.

City Attorney Steve Hirsch said that volunteer work on the park would not have to be covered but that Ms. Rynearson would have to be covered as caretaker whether she was a volunteer or not.

Ms. Rynearson noted that the workers who would remove the sheet rock had their own insurance.

Councilman Miesner moved to accept the proposal and Councilman Addleman seconded, as long as the city was removed from all legal and monetary liability.

Ms. Rynearson noted that her proposal included the city paying for the utilities at the building but nothing else.

Councilmen Miesner and Addleman voted for the proposal but council members Rob McFee, Mrs. Farr and Josh Williby voted against.

Ms. Rynearson thanked the council for their time.
