City says no to idea

c.haynes@nwkansas.com Although Oberlin City Council members said they were sympathetic to an idea for renovating the caretaker's house at Sappa Park, in the end, the vote was 3 to 2 against paying for work that would allow the building to be occupied.

Susan Rynearson had been talking to the council for a couple of months about renovating the house and living in it as sort of caretaker.

Last week, she sent what she said was a final request for \$4,500 to remove moldy sheet rock from the walls and basement ceiling. The money, she said, would be used for labor for two workers. The work, she said, needs to be done by professionals because it is somewhat dangerous due to the mold.

Ms. Rynearson told the council that, because of the black mold, the house is uninhabitable and unless something is done soon, will probably have to be torn down.

In the past, Ms. Rynearson has asked the council for help renovating the house and getting new appliances for it so she could move out there, trading her services to the city for living in the house.

This time, she just asked for help removing the black mold and said she would get volunteer help for any needed remodeling and ask for donations for appliances.

Mayor Bill Riedel cautioned the council that any decision they made concerning the property could set a precedent.

Councilwoman Fonda Farr said that she was worried that other people would have the same idea and be unhappy because they did not have a chance to live rent-free at the park.

Ms. Rynearson said that she would be working for her rent and thought that it would be good to have a caretaker living at the park. She noted that she had a home in town and doesn't need to live at the park.

His birth was attended by Dr. Glenda Maurer and he weighed in at a whopping 8 pounds, 5 ounces.


