City to widen old bridge south of town

The bridge, on Penn Avenue south of the railroad tracks near the Decatur Co-op, is deteriorating with broken boards, bent tubes and holes on one side

Wayne Hackney, owner of Oberlin Concrete, talked to the council at the last meeting about replacing the wood-plank east-side retaining wall on the bridge with concrete. The west side, already concrete, is in good shape, he said, but the east side is getting dangerous.

Mr. Hackney said that he would need help from the county crew because he doesn't have the equipment to do the heavy dirt work required for the job.
