### **Decatur Health Systems**

Discussion of management and finance systems, the installation of a new president and a renewed commitment to providing outreach clinics to the smaller surrounding towns were highlights of the Decatur Health Systems board meeting last Monday.

A team from Great Plains Health Alliance led by Roger John, president and chief executive officer of the Phillipsburg-based agency, delivered a presentation about the management, billing and finance systems it has to offer affiliated hospitals. The board listened to the presentation, and later agreed the hospital should continue to investigate what Great Plains had to offer while also looking into what other possible providers from the surrounding area such as Kearney or Hays could do - and to see if it would be feasible to stay with the setup the hospital has.
