The Old Testament lesson appointed for the First asks, "Father, I see the fire and the wood, but where to sacrifice his son, Isaac. This is to show that Abraham fears, loves and trusts in God above all other things.


Father Abraham knew, by faith, the words and promises of God about the Messiah "... and in your offspring shall the nations of the world will be blessed." (Gen. 22:18) By faith, Father Abraham knows that the Savior must come through him and his son, Isaac. So, Father Abraham also knows that if Isaac were to be put to death, that he would also be resurrected and brought back to life. This must happen in order for the words and promise of God to be fulfilled.

So, Father Abraham, by faith, tells his servants, "I and the boy will go over there and worship and then return to you." (Gen. 22:5) Also, when son Isaac

Sunday in Lent is Genesis 22:1-18. This is where is the Lamb for the burnt offering?" Father Abraham Father Abraham has his faith put to the test, and asked replies, "The Lord will provide for Himself a lamb for a burnt offering." (Gen. 22:7 - 8)

As things turn out, Father Abraham passes the test of faith without having to sacrifice his son, Isaac. An Angel of the Lord, whom many Bible scholars believe is Jesus, says to Father Abraham, "Do not lay a hand on the boy... now I know that you fear God." (Gen. 2:12). A ram is caught in a thicket and is sacrificed in place of Isaac. So, Father Abraham names the place, The Lord will provide." (Gen. 22: 14)

Our Lord always provides. He who provides the test of faith, also provides what is needed to pass the test – faith and trust in Him and His words and promise. St. Paul goes on to tell us, "He who did not spare his Son, how will He not also provide for us all things?" (Rom 8: 32)


