A.P. Vohs

A.P. Vohs, 83, Siloam Springs, Ark., husband of the former Darline Roe, died Jan. 28, 2012, at the Willard Walker Hospice Home in Fayetteville, Ark.

He was born Sept. 6, 1928, in McDonald, the only son of Albert Peter Vohs and Golda Irene (Mann) Vohs. He was reared on a farm near Edson and attended elementary and high school there, graduating in 1946. He rented his first 320 acres of land when he was 14, and continued farming with his father. He also operated a Grade A dairy.

He married Darline Roe of Oberlin on June 15, 1947. After he became a Christian, he organized and directed Goodland Youth for Christ and Gideons International became a part of his ministry. He helped organize the St. Francis Gideon Camp.

The couple moved to the St. Paul Bible College in 1952 and he was ordained to the ministry in 1955, then became pastor of Faith Bible Church in St. Paul. In 1958, the family moved to Greeley, Colo. where he attended The University of Northern Colorado, earning a bachelor's degree in elementary education and later a master's degree in psychology and guidance. While living in Greeley, he became director of Greeley Youth for Christ and started a Sunday School in the Big Thompson Canyon below Estes Park.

He was a graduate assistant at the University of Denver and at Northern Colorado. His first teaching position was at Lone, Colo., where he was principal and teacher in the upper elementary grades.

The family moved to Prairie Village in 1961, where he joined the faculty of Calvary Bible College, also serving as dean of men. He began pursuing a doctorate in education at the University of Missouri in Kansas City and completed that degree in administration at the University of Arkansas in 1970.

The couple's last move was to Siloam Springs, where he served at John Brown University as assistant professor of teacher education, director of audio visuals, director of admissions and supervisor of student teachers. He also taught at Northeastern State University at Tahlequah, Okla., in the graduate school, and Arkansas State College, Conway, at the Fayetteville West Campus. He served as interim principal at the Gravette High School and principal of the elementary school in 1988-89. He pastored churches in Arkansas, Oklahoma and Colorado.

He owned the Piano and Organ Studios in Fayetteville for 17 years and the Bible Bookstore in Siloam Springs. He was a member of the Kiwanis Club, Chamber of Commerce, Ministerial Alliance and Planning Commission in Siloam Springs.

Survivors include his wife, of the home; two sons, Evan (Dean) Vohs

and Randy (Connie) Vohs, and a daughter, Jan Potter, all of Siloam Springs; an aunt, Jo Mann, Goodland; two brothers-in-law, Bob Schimon, Carrier, Okla.; and John Odle, Towanda; nine grandchildren; and nine great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his parents and a sister, Elaine Rauscher.
