## 125 YEARS AGO — March 1887

On Jan. 1, the Union Pacific Railway adopted the bold experiment of running their trains by the 24-hour system and put it in vogue in the Idaho division After a test of nearly two months they are fully convinced that it is the only correct method of computing time. It will go into effect on the other divisions as soon as a change in time is made.
